

ESTABLISHED UNDER UNICAMERAL SYSTEM

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Composed of 16 legislators, four from each congressional district, nominated by the members residing therein, and approved by a majority vote of the Legislature; the Speaker to be a member. Meetings not less than two each year.

Its duty is to collect information of state-wide public importance and present a legislative program to the Legislature; and to establish and maintain bill drafting, reference and research services.

Members compensated for actual expenses incurred while attending sessions of the Council.
